

RESOLUTION #2020-41

A Resolution To Declare the City Manager as a Critical Infrastructure Worker and/or a Worker Necessary to Conduct Minimum Basic Operations During the COVID-19 Pandemic

**PURPOSE AND FINDING:** As the Council is aware, under several of the Governor's Executive Orders, the Governor allowed only those employees designated as part of critical infrastructure or necessary to conduct minimum basic operations were permitted to do in-person work. The vast majority of the city's departments qualify as necessary to conduct minimum basic operations and/or are critical infrastructure works as defined by the executive orders or the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA). Given that the City Manager as the chief administrative officer of the city oversees all of the departments, the City Manager likewise meets the definition of a critical infrastructure employee and/or an employee necessary to conduct minimum basic operations. This resolution designates the manager as such.

Council Member Williamson moved, supported by Council Member Smith, to approve the following resolution

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Albion City Manager is hereby designated as a critical infrastructure worker and/or a worker necessary to conduct minimum basic operations for the City of Albion.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that, Executive Order 2020-115 notwithstanding, the Albion City Council believes that the duties of the City Manager cannot be effectively performed remotely and need to be performed in person;


**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that as a critical infrastructure worker and/or worker necessary to conduct minimum basic operations for the City of Albion, the City Manager is permitted by the Governor's Executive Orders to perform his work in person;
