

**REGULAR MEETING  
JANUARY 11, 2018**

The Ashland Board of Commissioners met in Regular Session in the Commissioners' Chambers, City Building, Ashland, Kentucky, on Thursday, January 11, 2018, at the hour of 12:00 PM. Those present were Commissioners: Amanda Clark, Marty Gute, Matt Perkins, Marshall Steen and Mayor Stephen E. Gilmore, who presided. Also present were: Michael S. Graese, City Manager; Richard W. Martin, Interim Corporation Counsel; Susan W. Maddix, City Clerk, City Clerk; Todd Kelley, Chief of Police; Greg Ray, Fire Chief; Ryan Eastwood, Director of Engineering and Utilities; Chris Pullem, Community and Economic Development Director; Tony Grubb, Finance Director; Michelle Veach, Assistant Finance Director; Randy Carpenter, Acting Director of Public Works; Michelle Grubb, Finance Department; Major Scott Sexton and Major Bill Hensley, Ashland Police Department; Joanna King, Public Information Officer; and Reporters.

The invocation was given by Commissioner Gute.

The Pledge of Allegiance was conducted.

**AGENDA**

City Manager Graese presented the agenda of January 11, 2018. Motion was made by Gute, seconded by Perkins, to receive & file the agenda. Upon roll call, voting aye were Commissioners Clark, Gute, Perkins, Steen and Mayor Gilmore. Nay - none. Motion passed.

**MINUTES**

Motion was made by Clark, seconded by Perkins, to dispense with reading and approve the minutes of the Regular Meeting held on December 14, 2017. Upon roll call, voting aye were Commissioners Clark, Gute, Perkins, Steen and Mayor Gilmore. Nay – none. Motion passed.

**HEARINGS AND REPORTS**

**Mayor and City Commissioners' Comments**

Commissioner Perkins thanked employees of the Water Department for their efforts with recent water breaks. Commissioner Perkins noted the extreme conditions employees are working in to make sure the citizens of Ashland have water, and he has received numerous compliments from citizens. He stated the City's employees are critical to making our City successful.

Mayor Gilmore stated his appreciation of the citizens and their patience with all of the recent water breaks. He stated our Water Department is unbelievable and are special people. He reported that he has been continually kept up to date on the breaks and the status of each break. He appreciated the Water Department for keeping everyone informed. Mayor Gilmore also expressed appreciation to the Police and Fire Departments and believes the City of Ashland is truly blessed.

Commissioner Clark also expressed her appreciation for the expediency with which citizens are kept informed and the information getting to the citizens.

**City Manager's Report**

City Manager Graese reported on the following:

In addition to Water Distribution, Wastewater Collection was also called on to make repairs to broken lines. City Manager Graese noted the teamwork of City employees.

The City's Facebook, Instagram and Twitter accounts are operational and citizens may use them to stay informed.

**PUBLIC PARTICIPATION**

Whitney Lowe, Ashland in Motion (AIM), 1509 Winchester Avenue, appeared before the Commission to thank the Board for the 2017 grant in the amount of \$5,000 that was utilized to benefit the 29<sup>th</sup> Street businesses negatively affected by the construction of the 29<sup>th</sup> Street, Belmont Street and Simpson Road combined sewer overflow project. Ms. Lowe reported to the Commission the results and overall impact of the campaign to aid in the marketing and promotion of the businesses. The raffle, also supported by Build Ashland, elicited 2,103 qualifying submissions and generated \$31,445 in revenue for the participating businesses. Commissioner Gute thanked Ashland in Motion for taking the initiative to help. Ms. Lowe also informed the Commission on an upcoming event, the Gravy Bowl, scheduled for February 10 from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM at Park Place. It is a biscuit and gravy cook-off event fundraiser to support future Ashland in Motion initiatives.

Carly Carver, 3901 Blackburn Avenue, appeared before the Commission requesting permission to locate a "Sensory Garden" within Central Park. Ms. Carver relayed to the Commission various facts regarding autism. She advised that the proposed sensory garden would require a space of approximately 100 x 100 to 150 square feet. She advised the area would need direct sunlight for 4 to 8 hours with some shade tolerated. The location would also need even terrain, accessibility, no intense sensory input and no location near water. The project is a privately funded proposal; however, Ms. Carver requested that the City provide lighting and that the utility cost be paid for by the City. The project is a combined effort between Build Ashland, Southern Hills Garden Club, Buddy's Sensory Exchange and Pathways. The responsibility of routine maintenance and upkeep would be Buddy's Sensory Exchange and if for some reason Buddy's Sensory Exchange would be unavailable, Pathways will become responsible. Following discussion, Parks and Recreation Director Sean Murray will contact Ms. Carver regarding a meeting to be held with the Park Board regarding the request. The Park Board will then make a recommendation to the Board of Commissioners. Josh Blanton, Build Ashland, and Paula Profit Adkins, 3807 Blackburn Avenue, also appeared in support of the project.

Josh Blanton, Ashland Tennis Commission, appeared before the Commission regarding the Ashland Tennis Center (ATC). Mr. Blanton advised that the Ashland Tennis Center is an indoor and outdoor public facility which does not receive any federal, state or local funding and the last two years have been very difficult. He invited the community to come and visit or play tennis any time. It is a beautiful facility that should be utilized.

Allan Johnson, 616 Hoover Street, and Mike Crawford, President of the Northeast Kentucky Beekeepers Association, appeared before the Commission requesting an ordinance allowing beekeeping within the City and distributed information. Corporation Counsel Martin advised he will review the current ordinance to determine whether there is a need to make a change to the ordinance and will work with Community and Economic Development regarding possible zoning issues.

Leava Pickard, 2615 Moore Street, appeared before the Commission regarding property located at 2008 Dixon Street. The property is vacant and Ms. Pickard has been in touch with Code Enforcement regarding the amount of trash located in the front yard and the presence of rats due to the trash. Mayor Gilmore advised Ms. Pickard about an ordinance on the agenda for second reading regarding a 24-hour notice to property owners to clean up the property. If the property is not cleaned up within the 24-hour timeframe then the City of Ashland will enter the property and clean it up at the cost of the property owner. Director of Community and Economic Development Pullem advised the Commission that he will work with the Sanitation Division to remedy this situation.

**PUBLIC PARTICIPATION CONTINUED**

Robert Fields, Fields Flower Shop, 221 15<sup>th</sup> Street, appeared before the Commission to make some requests regarding the area surrounding his flower shop due to the hotel renovations currently taking place. Mr. Fields requested that use of the 4-foot area located directly behind the flower shop, which he believes is owned by the City, continue to be accessible to the flower shop following the conclusion of the hotel project. The rear door of the flower shop opens directly on to this 4-foot area. Mr. Fields also advised there is currently a handicap parking space located on 15<sup>th</sup> Street directly in front of the flower shop and he requested possibly changing the space to a loading zone if needed in the future. Mr. Fields' last request was regarding use of the alleyway between the flower shop and the hotel and what the plans are for the area. Mr. Fields was advised that the City currently does not know about the plans for the alleyway; however, the request for a loading zone, when needed, should be made to the Transportation Task Force. The Legal Department will work with the Department of Engineering and Utilities regarding the 4-foot area behind the flower shop.

On the West side of 16<sup>th</sup> Street in the 200 block; one space north of Winchester Avenue. (First angled parking space)

SECTION 2. That the Chief of Police is hereby authorized and directed to take appropriate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 3. That the Director of Public Works is hereby authorized and directed to install appropriate signs to carry the provisions of this ordinance into effect.

SECTION 4. Any person, firm or corporation violating the terms of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty and shall be fined pursuant to the provisions outlined in KRS 189.990.

SECTION 5. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, to the extent of such conflict only, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6. After its adoption, readoption and publication, as required by law, this ordinance shall be effective upon the installation of appropriate signs as herein directed.

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BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY:

SECTION 1. That Section 1 of Ordinance No. 41, series of 1993, being an ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY, PROHIBITING PARKING ON THE WEST SIDE OF 8<sup>TH</sup> STREET FROM CARTER AVENUE TO BATH AVENUE AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE", be and said section is hereby amended as follows, such amendments shown by underscoring all newly inserted language and by a single broken line through all deleted language:

SECTION 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to park and leave standing any vehicle on the west side of 8<sup>th</sup> Street from ~~Carter~~ Central Avenue to Bath Avenue.

SECTION 2. The Director of Public Works is hereby authorized and directed to install appropriate signs and/or curb or street markings to properly carry the provisions of this ordinance into effect.

SECTION 3. The Chief of Police is hereby authorized and directed to properly carry the provisions of this ordinance into effect and to take appropriate steps to enforce same.

SECTION 4. All other ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, to the extent of such conflict only, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption, readoption and publication, as required by law.

**ORDINANCE NO. 5, 2018**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY, AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 84, SERIES OF 2007, BY ADDING BLIGHTED PROPERTY TO THE ORDINANCE WHICH ESTABLISHED CRITERIA TO CLASSIFY PROPERTY AS ABANDONED AND ESTABLISHED A SEPARATE RATE OF TAXATION AT FOUR (4) TIME THE ANNUALLY ADOPTED AD VALOREM TAX RATE FOR ABANDONED URBAN PROPERTY.

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**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY:**

**SECTION 1.** That Ordinance No. 84, Series of 2007, being an ordinance entitled, “AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY, ESTABLISHING CRITERIA TO CLASSIFY PROPERTY AS ABANDONED AND ESTABLISHING A SEPARATE RATE OF TAXATION FOR ABANDONED URBAN PROPERTY”, be and said ordinance is hereby amended as follows, such amendments shown by underscoring all newly inserted language and by a single broken line through all deleted language:

**SECTION 1. ABANDONED OR BLIGHTED URBAN  
PROPERTY CLASSIFIED AS REAL  
PROPERTY**

Abandoned urban property is established as a separate classification of real property for the purpose of ad valorem taxation. As used in this ordinance, “abandoned urban property” means:

- 1) Any ~~vacant~~ structure or vacant unimproved lot or parcel of ground in the City which has been vacant, neglected or unimproved for a period of at least one year or having received three (3) or more citations for violations of the property maintenance code and which:
  - a) because it is dilapidated, unsanitary, unsafe, vermin infested, or otherwise dangerous to the safety of persons, it is unfit for its intended use; or
  - b) by reason of neglect or lack of maintenance has become a place for the accumulation of trash and debris, or has become infested with rodents or other vermin; or
  - c) has been tax delinquent for a period of at least three years.

**SECTION 2. RATE OF TAXATION FOR ABANDONED OR  
BLIGHTED URBAN PROPERTIES**

The rate of taxation levied upon abandoned or blighted urban properties shall be four (4) times the annually adopted ad valorem tax rate.

**SECTION 3. CLASSIFICATION OF PROPERTY AS  
ABANDONED OR BLIGHTED URBAN  
PROPERTY; RIGHT TO APPEAL**

1) The City of Ashland Code Enforcement Board shall each year determine which properties in the City are abandoned or blighted urban properties and shall prepare and furnish a list of abandoned or blighted properties located in the City to the City Finance Department and to the Boyd County Property Valuation Administrator prior to January 1 of each year.

2) Except as otherwise provided in section 3 of this section a property classified by the City of Ashland Code Enforcement Board as abandoned or blighted urban property as of January 1 shall be taxed as abandoned or blighted urban property for such tax year. If the owner repairs, rehabilitates, or otherwise returns the property to productive use so that the property is no longer abandoned or blighted urban property, he or she shall notify the City, which shall, if it finds the property no longer abandoned or blighted urban property, notify the City Finance Department and the Boyd County Property Valuation Administrator to strike the property from the list of abandoned or blighted urban properties as of the succeeding January 1.

3) No later than March 1 of each year, the City of Ashland Code Enforcement Board shall mail, by first class mail, to the owner(s) of each abandoned or blighted urban property, as those name(s) are listed in the records of the Property Valuation Administrator, a notice this property has been classified as abandoned or blighted urban property. The owner of any abandoned or blighted urban property who believes his, her or its property has been incorrectly classified may appeal such classification to the City of Ashland Code Enforcement Board. Such appeal shall be in writing and shall be made no later than April 1 of that year. The City of Ashland Code Enforcement Board shall afford the owner the opportunity for a hearing. If the City of Ashland Code Enforcement Board finds the property was incorrectly classified as abandoned or blighted urban property, it shall cause the property to be removed from the list of properties so classified. The City of Ashland Code Enforcement Board shall develop policies and procedures for conducting such appeals.

**SECTION 2.** If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is held unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, such infirmity shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance.

**SECTION 3.** All ordinances or parts of ordinance in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 4.** This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption, readoption and publication, as required by law.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY, AMENDING SECTION 2 OF ORDINANCE NO. 106, SERIES OF 2009, WHICH ADOPTED THE 2009 EDITION AND ALL SUBSEQUENT EDITIONS OF THE INTERNATIONAL PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE REDUCING THE TIME FRAME FROM TEN (10) DAYS TO ONE 24-HOUR PERIOD FOR THE REMOVAL OF ITEMS NOT REGULARLY DISPOSED OF IN HOUSEHOLD TRASH.

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BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY:

SECTION 1. That Section 2 of Ordinance No. 106, Series of 2009, being an ordinance entitled, “AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY, ADOPTING THE 2009 EDITION AND ALL SUBSEQUENT EDITIONS OF THE INTERNATIONAL PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE, REGULATING AND GOVERNING THE CONDITIONS AND MAINTENANCE OF ALL PROPERTY, BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES; BY PROVIDING THE STANDARDS FOR SUPPLIED UTILITIES AND FACILITIES AND OTHER PHYSICAL THINGS AND CONDITIONS ESSENTIAL TO ENSURE THAT STRUCTURES ARE SAFE, SANITARY AND FIT FOR OCCUPATION AND USE; AND THE CONDEMNATION OF BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES UNFIT FOR HUMAN OCCUPANCY AND USE, AND THE DEMOLITION OF SUCH EXISTING STRUCTURES IN THE CITY OF ASHLAND; PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS AND COLLECTION OF FEES AND SHALL BE KNOWN AS “THE CITY OF ASHLAND PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE” AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 132, SERIES OF 1996 OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND AND AMENDING ALL OTHER ORDINANCES WHICH REFERENCE ORDINANCE NO. 132, SERIES OF 1996 TO NOW REFER TO THIS ORDINANCE”, be and said ordinance is hereby amended as follows, such amendments shown by underscoring all newly inserted language and by a single broken line through all deleted language:

**SECTION 2.** The following sections are hereby revised:

Section 101.1. Insert: City of Ashland

Section 103.5. Insert: For all violations of the Property Maintenance Code the fines shall be as follows:

<u>1<sup>st</sup> Offense</u>	<u>2<sup>nd</sup> Offense</u>	<u>3<sup>rd</sup> Offense</u>
Minimum Fine \$ 75.00	Minimum Fine \$ 150.00	Minimum Fine \$250.00
Maximum Fine \$ 150.00	Maximum Fine \$ 300.00	Maximum Fine \$500.00

In addition to all fines a \$100.00 service fee will be included for all citations to offset the administrative costs of the Property Maintenance Division.

The minimum fine will be imposed in all 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> offenses unless the Code Enforcement Board directs that the maximum fine be imposed. In the event that an offense occurs more than 3 times in calendar year or is habitually occurring over a span of years the officer will be directed to automatically impose the maximum fine for the offense beginning with the 4<sup>th</sup> occurrence and to continue weekly until the offense is corrected.

NOTE: Costs incurred by the City to abate nuisances will be added to the fines listed above at a rate equal to \$70.00 per hour for each crew member and piece of equipment used in the abatement billed in full hour increments, as well as actual cost of materials used in the abatement. Cost for abatement if performed by an agency contracted by the City shall be equal to actual cost and payable directly to the contracted agency.

Section 108.5 Delete: for the penalties provided by this code.  
Insert: for a fine of not less than \$500.00 or not more than \$1000.00.

Section 112.4. Insert: not less than \$500.00 or not more than \$1000.00

Section 302.4. Insert: 10 inches in height

Section 304.14. Insert: During the period from April 15 to November 1

Section 308.4 Insert: **Disposal of large or abandoned items.** Neither the owner nor tenant of any property shall dispose of any large or abandoned items left inside or out of a dwelling or other structure on the property by leaving the items unattended on the curb outside of the city provided container. Should a property owner or tenant require disposal of un-bagged items, tree limbs, furniture or other items not regularly disposed of in household trash then a special removal request may be made with the Solid Waste Division of the Public Works Department for disposal at the current rate set forth by ordinance for removal of such items, providing the city utility service is active and in good standing at this location. Failure of the property owner or tenant to file a special removal request prior to placing the items on the curb will result in a written 24-hour notice being placed on the premises deeming it the sole responsibility of the person having control of the property to properly dispose of the items. Failure to dispose of the items within the allotted time will result in removal of the items by the Solid Waste Division of the Public Works Department at the current rate of disposal as well as the appropriate fine for the offense being issued by the Property Maintenance Inspector.

Section 602.3. Insert: to furnish heat to the *occupants* thereof shall supply heat during the period from October 1 to May 15 to maintain a temperature of not less than 68°F (20°C) in all habitable rooms, *bathrooms* and *toilet rooms*.

Section 602.4. Insert: Indoor occupiable work spaces shall be supplied with heat during the period from October 1 to May 15 to maintain a temperature of not less than 65°F (18°C) during the period the spaces are occupied.

SECTION 2. That if any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The City of Ashland Board of Commissioners hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance, and each section, subsection, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses and phrases be declared unconstitutional.
