Through public and private efforts, Ashland, Kentucky has made great strides in both reducing rape and sexual abuse and improving our response to these survivors. These individuals deserve to be treated with dignity and respect by our criminal justice system and society at large.

Victims often must cope with the long-lasting psychological, financial and physical consequences of rape. We recognize that our response to crime victims plays an important role in their efforts to rebuild their lives. As a nation devoted to liberty and justice for all, America must increase its efforts to protect, restore, and expand victims’ rights.

Let us gratefully acknowledge all who play significant roles in rebuilding the lives of victims, especially the more than 3,800 community and system-based victim service programs across the United States that respond to rape victims with dignity, compassion, and respect – values that Americans hold dearly. In the state of Kentucky more than 4,500 people received services for rape and sexual assault in 2017. Also included are the 839 family members and friends of these victims who received counseling and support related to a loved one’s rape or sexual assault. These counseling sessions for victims and their loved ones totaled 13,807. In addition, more than 3,500 crises calls were fielded across the state relating to rape or sexual assault. As well as victim services, the rape crises centers provided 3,278 education and training programs that reached 84,832 people in 2017.

Let us in particular express our appreciation for those victims of rape and sexual abuse who have turned personal tragedy into a motivating force to improve the rights and resources available to other rape victims and to build a better, more just community.

Ashland and the state of Kentucky have adopted laws to protect the rights of victims of rape and provide them certain essential services. Let us celebrate a nation where these laws are enforced. It is up to each of us to do what we can to adhere to the spirit of those laws and those values on which our nation was founded. Let us treat all victims of rape and sexual abuse with compassion, regardless of race, age, gender, ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, or income.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Stephen E. Gilmore, Mayor of the City of Ashland, Kentucky, by virtue of the authority vested in me do hereby proclaim the month of April, Sexual Assault Prevention/Awareness Month, and recognize April as National Sexual Assault Awareness month, and I urge the citizens of Ashland, Kentucky to reaffirm our commitment to victims' rights and America's values, ensuring that rape victims receive our utmost respect, understanding, and compassion this month and throughout the year.

Speed Limit on Route 168

The speed limit has been changed recently and is 45 MPH. Ashland Police Department has been working with the residents regarding enforcement. Chief Kelley advised that APD will continue to monitor the situation.

Jerry Thompson, 3861 Leighwood Drive, appeared before the Commission to report on a meeting held with Huntington officials regarding the opioid addiction crisis. The small group of concerned citizens, along with Commissioner Perkins, met with the officials regarding a drug control policy. Mr. Thompson wanted to inform the Commission of the meeting and the group of concerned citizens would be preparing a detailed report to present to the Commission in the future with possible suggestions for the Board to consider.

Jolene Thompson, 3861 Leighwood Drive, appeared before the Commission to report that her graduating class is organizing a rally against opioids to be held on June 2 and would love the support of the Commission.

ORDINANCE NO. 61, 2018

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY, AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING STEPHEN E. GILMORE, MAYOR, TO EXECUTE A CONTRIBUTION--IN--AID--OF--CONSTRUCTION AGREEMENT FOR ELECTRIC DISTRIBUTION SERVICE BETWEEN THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY, AND KENTUCKY POWER COMPANY FOR THE INSTALLATION OF SEVEN (7) NEW POWER POLES AND A ONE-PHASE TAP FOR NEW SERVICE TO THE LOGTOWN WATER STORAGE TANK AT EAST PARK FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF ENGINEERING AND UTILITIES AT A COST OF \$4,708.20.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY:

SECTION 1. That the Mayor, Stephen E. Gilmore, is hereby authorized and directed to execute on behalf of said City a Contribution-In-Aid-Of-Construction Agreement for electric distribution service between the City of Ashland and Kentucky Power Company for the installation of seven (7) new power poles and a one-phase tap for new service to the Logtown water storage tank at East Park for the purpose of installing a tank aeration system for TTHM removal and for the installation of chlorine analyzer for the Department of Engineering and Utilities. The City will pay \$4,708.20, cut the right-of-way and install underground conduit (all of which has been completed). Said agreement is attached hereto and made a part hereof by reference.

SECTION 2. All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, to the extent of such conflict only, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption, readoption and publication, as required by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 63, 2018

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY, CREATING THE DIVISION OF RECREATION; THE DIVISION OF PARK MAINTENANCE; CREATING THE BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS AND PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF THE MEMBERS THEREOF; AND REPEALING ALL PRIOR RECREATION COMMISSIONS AND BOARDS OF PARK COMMISSIONERS, ORDINANCE NO. 27, SERIES OF 1999.

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Ashland has determined that public parks, playgrounds and recreation facilities within the City of Ashland may be more efficiently, orderly and economically administered by the creation of the Department of Parks and Recreation;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY:

SECTION 1. That Ordinance No. 27, series of 1999, being an ordinance entitled, “AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY, CREATING THE DIVISION OF RECREATION; THE DIVISION OF PARK MAINTENANCE; CREATING THE BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS AND PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF THE MEMBERS THEREOF; CREATING A CITY TREE BOARD AND PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS THEREOF; AND REPEALING ALL PRIOR RECREATION COMMISSIONS AND BOARDS OF PARK COMMISSIONERS, ORDINANCE NO. 32, SERIES OF 1973, ORDINANCE NO. 63, SERIES OF 1978 AND ALL AMENDMENTS THERETO,”

SECTION 2. DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION. Pursuant to the provisions of Kentucky Revised Statutes 97.020 and 97.441, there is hereby created the Division of Recreation for the City of Ashland.

The Department of Parks and Recreation shall consist of such officers and employees as shall be provided by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Ashland. The Department of Parks and Recreation shall coordinate, supervise and oversee the recreational use of all public parks and any lands or lots heretofore or hereafter devised and bequeathed to the City of Ashland for park purposes, including, but not limited to, 47th Street Park (Boat Dock), AK Steel Sports Park, C. Wendell Banks Park (a/k/a Southside Park), Norman “Dutch” Berry Park, Central Park, Dawson Park and Pool, East Central Park, Joseph P. Harris Linear Park, Oliverio (formerly Clyffeside) Park, Pollard Mills Park, Riverfront Park (Port of Ashland), Charles and Betty Russell Park, Spring Park and such other City properties as defined by KRS 97.425.

The Department of Parks and Recreation shall be responsible for the scheduling of the use of city facilities and parks and shall be responsible for the operation and administration of city recreation programs. The Department of Parks and Recreation shall, with the approval of the Board of Commissioners, after consultation with the Park Board, promulgate and post such rules and regulations as is deemed necessary for the conduct of persons in the parks. The Department of Parks and Recreation shall coordinate efforts with the other departments of city government and the office of the City Manager.

Further, there is hereby recreated the position of Park Superintendent.

The duties of the Park Superintendent are as follows:

(1) shall have charge of the care and upkeep of all parks and pools owned by the City of Ashland and shall see that such parks and pools are kept in a clean and well-maintained condition;

(2) shall report to the Director of the Department of Parks and Recreation when any of the park buildings or equipment need repair;

(3) shall see that all play areas and facilities are kept in good and safe condition and that all rest rooms and facilities are kept in a clean and sanitary condition.

(4) shall have supervision over all employees assigned to work in the Department of Parks and Recreation with the exception of the Director; and

(5) shall coordinate the efforts of the Department of Parks and Recreation with the other departments of city government and the office of the City Manager.

SECTION 3. PARK BOARD COMPENSATION

Members of the Park Board shall serve without compensation.

SECTION 4. PARK BOARD. Pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statutes 97.455 and 97.465, there is hereby created a Board of Park Commissioners commonly known and referred to as the "Park Board."

The Park Board shall consist of seven members who are citizens and residents of this City and shall be appointed by the Mayor with the approval of the Board of City Commissioners.

The members of the Park Board shall be appointed for terms of four years, except that the members first appointed shall be so appointed that the terms of not more than two (2) members shall expire in the same year. Appointments made to fill an unexpired term shall be made for the remainder of the unexpired term.

Absence from more than two (2) consecutive meetings may constitute cause for removal from office. Any member of the Park Board may be removed by majority vote of the members of the legislative body of the City of Ashland.

The Park Board shall be an advisory board only and shall advise the legislative body and the Director of Parks and Recreation of the City regarding City parks and recreational programs and projects and shall advise the legislative body and the Director of Parks and Recreation as to methods to promote the full use of all park facilities in the interest of the public.

The Park Board shall establish rules not inconsistent with the foregoing provisions and shall fix the time and place for holding of its meetings.

SECTION 5. PARK BOARD DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The Park Board shall be responsible for the City's policy regarding, removal, topping and planting of trees in Central Park, Oliverio Park and all present and future parks and on the rights-of-way in the downtown Central Business District bounded on the East by 18th Street, on the North by Greenup Avenue, on the West by 12th Street and on the South by Carter Avenue.

It shall additionally be the responsibility of the Board to study, investigate, the care, preservation, pruning, planting, replanting, removal or disposition of trees and shrubs located in parks, and downtown business areas. The Board, when requested by the City Commission, shall consider, investigate, make a finding, report, and for recommendation upon any special matter or question coming within the scope of its work.

SECTION 6. DEFINITIONS

Street trees: "Street trees" are herein defined as trees, shrubs, bushes, and all other woody vegetation on land lying between property lines on either side of all streets, avenues, or ways within the City.

Park trees: "Park trees" are herein defined as trees, shrubs, bushes, and all other woody vegetation in public parks having individual names, and all areas owned by the City, or to which the public has free access as a park.

SECTION 7. STREET TREE SPECIES TO BE PLANTED

The Park Board shall maintain an official Street Tree species list for the City of Ashland, Kentucky. No other species may be planted as Street Trees without written prior approval of the Park Board.

SECTION 8. SPACING

No trees may be planted closer together than the following: Small Trees, 30 feet; Medium Trees, 40 feet; and Large Trees, 50 feet; except in special plantings designed or approved by the Park Board. The Park Board official street tree list shall designate trees by the three sizes.

SECTION 9. DISTANCE FROM CURB AND SIDEWALK

The distance trees may be planted from curbs or curblines and sidewalks will be in accordance with the three species size classes listed in Section 15 above, and no trees may be planted closer to any curb or sidewalk than the following: Small Trees, 2 feet; Medium Trees, 3 feet; and Large Trees, 4 feet.

SECTION 10. DISTANCE FROM STREET CORNERS AND FIREPLUGS

No Street Tree shall be planted closer than 35 feet to any street corner, measured from the point of nearest intersecting curbs or curblines. No Street Tree shall be planted closer than 10 feet to any fireplug.

SECTION 11. UTILITIES

No Street Trees other than those species listed as Small Trees in Section 15 above may be planted under or within 10 lateral feet of any overhead utility wire, or over or within 5 lateral feet of any underground water line, sewer line, transmission line or other utility.

SECTION 12. TREE TOPPING

It shall be unlawful as a normal practice for any person, firm, or city department to top any tree located in the parks and Downtown Business District, Park Tree, or other tree on public property without prior City Manager approval. Topping is defined as the severe cutting back of limbs to stubs larger than three inches in diameter within the tree's crown to such a degree so as to remove the normal canopy and disfigure the tree. Trees severely damaged by storms or other causes, or certain trees under utility wires or other obstructions where other pruning practices are impractical may be exempted from this ordinance at the determination of the Park Board and/or City Manager.

SECTION 13. PUBLIC TREE CARE

The City has the right to plant, prune, maintain and remove trees, plants, shrubs within the lines of all streets, alleys, avenues, lanes, squares and public grounds, as may be necessary to insure public safety or to preserve or enhance the symmetry and beauty of such public grounds. Nothing contained herein shall affect the City Manager's exercise of discretion as to normal trimming.

The City Park Board shall recommend to the City Manager removal of any tree or part thereof which is in an unsafe condition or which by reason of its nature is injurious to sewers, electric power lines, gas lines, water lines, or other public improvements, or is affected with any injurious fungus, insect or other pest. The City Manager shall have final authority. This Section does not prohibit the planting of Street Trees by adjacent property owners providing that the selection and location of said trees in accordance with the provisions of this section.

SECTION 14. Should any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance be held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect any other portion of this ordinance, it being the intention of the Board of Commissioners to enact this ordinance section by section, subsection by subsection, and all sentences, clauses or phrases hereof independently of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase.

SECTION 15. That Ordinance No. 27, Series of 1999, is hereby repealed and all other ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, to the extent of such conflict only, are also hereby repealed.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY, AMENDING SECTION 5 OF ORDINANCE NO. 21, SERIES OF 2012, WHICH IS COMMONLY KNOWN AND REFERRED TO AS THE "SIGN ORDINANCE" REGARDING REGULATIONS ON OUTDOOR ADVERTISING.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY:

SECTION 1. That Section 5 of Ordinance No. 21, Series of 2012, being an ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY, ADOPTING THE SIGN REGULATIONS FOR THE CITY OF ASHLAND, KENTUCKY, AND REPEALING ARTICLE VII OF ORDINANCE NO. 101, 1986 COMMONLY KNOWN AND REFERRED TO AS THE "ZONING ORDINANCE" AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NO 56, SERIES OF 1998," which is commonly known and referred to as the "Sign Ordinance" be and said section is hereby amended as follows, such amendments shown by underscoring all newly inserted language and by a single broken line through all deleted language:

Section 5. PERMITTED SIGNS

Only signs as described herein and as may be permitted otherwise in these regulations will be allowed. No sign described by this Section shall be erected unless a permit for the same has been issued by the Code Enforcement Officer. All signs erected under the requirements of this Section may be illuminated in accordance with Section 6 unless provided otherwise herein. "Districts" refer to zoning districts as depicted on the Official Zoning Map of the City.

A. Residential Districts

1. Permanent, identification signs for subdivision, mobile home parks, and travel trailer campgrounds not exceeding fifteen (15) square feet in area are permitted. One (1) sign may be erected at each major entrance to the subdivision, mobile home park or travel campground; and shall be no closer than ten (10) feet in height above ground level, and shall be parallel to the street frontage.
2. One (1) permanent, identification sign for multi-family residential developments may be erected at each major entrance to the property. Such signs shall not exceed fifteen (15) square feet in area and may be flat-mounted against the wall of an apartment building or freestanding, if freestanding, such signs shall be set back ten (10) feet from property line and shall not exceed six (6) feet in height above ground level, and be parallel to the street frontage.
3. Signs for home occupations shall be limited to one (1) sign not exceeding four (4) square feet in area. Such signs shall be unlighted and mounted flat against the wall of the principal building.

4. One (1) permanent, freestanding sign for non-residential uses permitted as a matter of right, conditionally, or as nonconformities (other than home occupations), may be erected on the premises, provided such signs do not exceed twenty (20) square feet in area. No freestanding sign shall be located closer than ten (10) feet to any property line nor exceed six (6) feet in height above ground level. Such signs shall be parallel to the street frontage.
 5. Non-residential uses permitted as-of-right, conditionally, or as nonconformities (other than home occupations) may have a flat-mounted wall sign. No single sign shall exceed twenty (20) square feet in area.
- B. **Neighborhood Business, Public Hospital Districts**
 With the B-1 Neighborhood and P-H Public Hospital Districts as shown on the Zoning Map, only the following types of signs shall be permitted:
1. One (1) freestanding sign shall be permitted for each zoning lot. The area of the sign shall not exceed one (1) square foot for each one (1) foot of lot width, provided no such sign shall exceed fifty (50) square feet. Any such sign shall not exceed fifteen (15) feet in height.
 2. Flat-mounted wall signs are permitted for each separate business establishment, provided the total allowable sign area for all such signs shall not exceed one (1) square foot for each linear foot of building wall facing a public street or common drive (such as in a unified shopping center).
 3. One (1) identification sign per business may be suspended from or attached to the underside of a canopy or marquee provided such sign does not exceed six (6) square feet in area, and shall maintain a clear distance of at least ten (10) feet between the sidewalk and the bottom of the sign, not over the public right-of-way.
- C. **General Business**
 Within the B-2 General Business District as shown on the Zoning Map, only the following types of signs shall be permitted:
1. One (1) permanent, freestanding sign is permitted for each zoning lot. The area of the sign shall not exceed two (2) square feet for each one (1) linear foot of street frontage, or a total of one hundred (100) square feet in area, whichever is less. Any such freestanding sign shall not exceed thirty (30) feet in height.
 2. Unified shopping centers and other zoning lots with more than three hundred (300) feet of street frontage may have one (1) additional freestanding sign for each additional three hundred (300) feet of street frontage or portion thereof. The ratio stated in Section 5 C.1 shall apply to such additional signage, as if the additional frontage was a separate lot.
 3. Permanent flat-mounted signs are permitted for each separate business establishment, provided the total allowable sign areas for all such signs shall not exceed two (2) square feet for each linear foot of building wall facing a public street or common drive (such as a unified shopping center).
 4. One (1) sign projecting from a building façade per street frontage is permitted for each business establishment—in the absence of flat-mounted wall signs. Such sign shall not project more than ten (10) feet from the building façade, and shall not exceed thirty-two (32) square feet in area. Projecting signs, shall not extend above the top of the building parapet or roof ridge; shall maintain a clear distance of at least ten (10) feet above the sidewalk; and shall be totally on/over private property.

5. One (1) identification sign per business establishment may be suspended from or attached to the underside of a canopy or marquee, provided such sign does not exceed six (6) square feet in area and maintains a clear distance of at least ten (10) feet between the sidewalk and the bottom of the sign, not over the public right-of-way.
 6. ~~One (1) outdoor advertising sign structure is permitted on each zoning lot. Such structure shall meet all building setback and yard requirements of the zoning district, or at least ten (10) feet back from all property lines; and in addition, shall be no closer than seventy-five (75) feet to a residential zone. Three hundred (300) feet shall separate one structure from another (on the same side of a street or around a corner). On a zoning lot with more than three hundred (300) feet of street frontage, one (1) outdoor advertising structure is permitted for each additional three hundred (300) feet of street frontage (or portion thereof). Outdoor advertising signs shall not exceed three hundred (300) square feet in area per facing, with no more than two (2) facings per side, or forty (40) feet in height. All outdoor advertising sign structures must meet state guidelines when facing state and/or federal roadways.~~
 - (a) One (1) outdoor advertising sign structure is permitted on each zoning lot. The lot must abut a federal or state highway.
 - (b) To allow one (1) LED billboard, four (4) old regular billboard structures (if any) within six hundred feet (600') radius of the proposed LED billboard location must be taken down.
 - (c) Such structure shall meet all building setback and yard requirements of the zoning district, or at least ten feet (10') back from all property lines; and in addition, shall be no closer than seventy-five feet (75') to a residential zone. Five hundred feet (500') shall separate one (1) structure from another (on the same side of a street or around a corner) on a zoning lot with more than three hundred feet (300') of street frontage. One (1) outdoor advertising structure is permitted for each additional five hundred feet (500') of street frontage (or portion thereof). Outdoor advertising signs shall not exceed three hundred (300) square feet in area per facing, with no more than two (2) facings per side, or forty feet (40') in height. All outdoor advertising sign structures must meet state guidelines when facing state and/or federal roadways.
- D. Business/Downtown District
 Within the B-3 Business/Downtown district as shown on the Zoning Map, only the following types of signs shall be permitted:
1. One (1) permanent, freestanding sign is permitted for each zoning lot. The area of the sign shall not exceed one (1) square foot for each linear foot of street frontage, or a total of sixty (60) square feet, whichever is less. Any such freestanding sign shall not exceed twenty (20) feet in height.
 2. Permanent flat-mounted wall signs are permitted for each separate business establishment provided the total allowable sign area for all such signs shall not exceed one (1) square foot for each linear foot of building wall facing a public street.

3. - E. Industrial Districts
 Within the I-1 and I-2 industrial districts as shown on the Zoning Map, only the following types of signs shall be permitted:
1. One (1) permanent, freestanding sign is permitted for each zoning lot. The area of the sign shall not exceed two (2) square feet for each linear foot of lot width, or a total of one hundred (100) square feet, whichever is less. Any such freestanding sign shall not exceed thirty (30) feet in height.
 2. One (1) industrial park identification sign is permitted on each park frontage, not to exceed two hundred (200) square feet in area or thirty (30) feet in height.
 3. Permanent flat-mounted wall signs are permitted for each separate business, provided the total allowable sign area for all such signs shall not exceed two (2) square feet for each linear foot of building wall facing a public street or common drive (such as in a unified industrial park).
 4. One (1) sign projecting from a building façade per street frontage is permitted for each business establishment—in the absence of flat-mounted wall signs. Such sign shall not project more than ten (10) feet from the building, and shall not exceed thirty-two (32) square feet in area. Projecting signs shall not extend above the top of the building parapet or roof ridge; shall maintain a clear distance of at least ten (10) feet above the sidewalk; and shall be totally on/over private property.
 5. One (1) identification sign per business establishment may be suspended from or attached to the underside of a canopy or marquee, provided such sign does not exceed six (6) square feet in area and maintains a clear distance of at least ten (10) feet between the sidewalk and the bottom of the sign, not over public right-of-way.
